

Introduction

We have completed 5 years building collective solutions to tackle climate change in the most challenging year in the recent history of humanity. We learned about resilience, we made our first humanitarian aid actions, we adapted our work to virtuality and we explored other alternatives to reach our communities. Many times we felt vulnerable, but with the confidence that we are part of an evolutionary process in which more than ever we have the opportunity to promote change and regenerate our common home.

Through a collaborative effort with the public and private sectors, civil society, and academia, we have mobilized more than 90,000 people, around resilient and low carbon cities, in more than 120 cities. During 2020, we focused our efforts to put on the public agenda topics such as regenerative development, declarations of climate emergency, natural capital, climate finance, the economy, the risks and opportunities of climate change, green universities, and the digital footprint.

We also consolidated our Low Carbon City World Forum whose fifth version was carried out digitally, where all sectors meet to talk about regenerative development, green and resilient recovery, planetary health, circular economy, the role of children in climate action and frontier technology, among others.

We developed tools for teaching climate change and empowering children to be creators of solutions, with some one-on-one mentoring in places where there is no internet connectivity, which we hope to continue expanding.

We present below a compilation of the more than 40 activities carried out during 2020, where we educated and raised awareness about climate change. promoted opportunities to change our behaviors. connected citizens experts to collaborate and created together solutions collective with communities the, public, private sector and academia

It is a year of gratitude for all those who have accompanied, supported and encouraged us to continue on this path.


Our Strategy

We joined the Global Carbon Removal Task Force that will formally transition to the Global Carbon Removal Partnership at COP26 in Glasgow in 2021, which will convene and catalyze stakeholders from around the world to make political commitments, align priorities strategies, strengthen capacities and foster innovation to remove and store carbon.

We are one of the founding members of Count Us In, a community that seeks over the next decade to mobilize one billion people to take practical action to reduce emissions and challenge leaders to act boldly to bring about change in global systems.



Collaborative Families

Our heart is in Moravia neighbourhood in Medellin and together with the community we have developed various projects and solutions for sustainability since 2017. They have been our teachers and have supported us unconditionally. Therefore, when the pandemic struck, we built a chain of solidarity and resilience to accompany the most affected families during lockdown. This allowed:

- Connect supporter families with beneficiary families and create bonds of solidarity.
- Improve food security and resilience of families during lockdown.
- Avoid exposure to the virus, and decrease the risk of contagion.

As with the climate change crisis, COVID-19 requires a collective response at the individual, family, community, regional, national municipal, international level. Because of this, our physical and mental health is at risk, but also our ability to respond and adapt. That is the reason why we created in alliance with Talento Verde and the Psychiatrist Alejandra Gutierrez, a small "kit" with some tools to facilitate adaptation to the current situation. contributing to the well-being ourselves and our families, to maintain and mental health physical especially, to increase our resilience capacity in the face of the crisis.

Within the framework of our One Thousand Children. One Thousand Solutions program, we created tools for Moravian children belonging to the "guardians of the hill" local collective and their families, to learn about climate change and develop actions aimed at sustainable building more neighborhood. We delivered a school supplies kit and educational worksheets of activities at home, accompanied by guidance socially distance workshops and door-to-door mentoring to guarantee safety. Likewise, we supported the children's families with vegan staples.

This project was made possible thanks to the support of the Pollination Project, Puntos Verdes Lito, and community leaders.



Social Innovation award

The second version of the Innovation Award, sought to design an experience of participation and promotion of sustainability among the collaborators and volunteers of Grupo Argos and its subsidiaries, aimed at raising awareness about the importance of being an agent of change in their cities, transmitting their knowledge and to foster proactive habits towards being part of the solution. The award included national and international iuries that supported the process representatives from Ciudad Emergente de Chile, PCDN Network from the United States, Impact Hub and Tierra Grata Colombia.

The winners were:

CO-PRO-FUTURO:

Professional co-processing with a vision of the future. Develop an innovative and sustainable solution for social inclusion that integrates communities into the value chain through the responsible management of cement waste. From Tegucigalpa, Honduras.

Powerful fabrics: "Today the street is harder than ever and particularly for sex workers. " Through powerful fabrics and new futures, they seek new alternatives and paths for sex workers who have suffered the worst consequences of the pandemic.

Impacto Vital: Design and implementation of a raw water treatment system in the town of Las Piedras Municipality Toluviejo - Department of Sucre, Colombia.





Within the framework of the award, a kit "Agents of change for transformation" was created. This kit addressed the current crisis from the perspective of inclusion and resilience, public education and mental health. It provided tools meant for a non-specialized audience, to learn about the management of social and non-profit innovation projects, systems change, and monitoring and evaluation of social impact indicators.




Citizen award

We believe that citizens can, together with their leaders, propose a more sustainable future, building more resilient communities throughout the Colombian territory.

For this reason, and with the purpose of promoting citizen participation in the formulation of development plans in municipalities of Colombia in matters related to mitigation and adaptation to climate change, we launched the citizen award "What is your Plan?".

People, academia, groups and non-profit organizations from 20 municipalities in 11 departments of the country had the opportunity to participate in this award,

with projects or project pilots that contribute to solving a problem associated with mitigation or adaptation for climate in your municipality.






Economics, Risks and Opportunities of Climate Change Congress.

With the aim of making visible the effects, risks and opportunities that the climate crisis, and green transition can have on different productive sectors; in addition to the long-term research agenda on the Study of Economic Impacts of Climate Change for Colombia (EIECC) coordinated by the National Planning Department, we organized this event. In this virtual space we brought together experts from public and private organizations such as Sura, Fondo Acción, the Ministry of Environment and Sustainable Development, Transforma, PRI, the National Planning Department, among others.







III Climate Finance Forum

On May 21st, we held the III National Forum on Climate Finance, with the purpose of publicizing the different tools and mechanisms available for climate finance, as well as the actors currently leading the issue in Colombia.

The Forum was a virtual, free and open space that brought together experts from private organizations and national and international government entities such as National Planning Department, the Climate Bonds Initiative. UNEP. EcoRegistry, British Embassy in Colombia, Grupo ISA, the Swiss Embassy in Colombia. Fondo Acción. Atmosphere Alternative. Hill and Consulting; around issues such as the voluntary carbon market, green bonds, public policy on climate finance, among others.







III Green Universities Forum

On October 8th, we held the third edition of the Green Universities forum, that revolved around "Education for Sustainable Development by 2030" in partnership with EAFIT and EAN University. The event counted with the participation of the UNESCO International Institute for Higher Education in Latin America and the Caribbean (IESALC), showcasing five transformative experiences of education in sustainable development.







Climate conversations

Climate Conversations is a format that aims to promote a national, regional and local dialogue around the climate crisis and climate emergency declarations. Its objective is to promote spaces for convergence, cooperation and alignment of agendas, around solutions that allow accelerating climate action in the territories. These events were organized by Low Carbon City with the support of ICLEI-South America / ICLEI - Colombia and Territorios Sostenibles. The first, held on June 24th, revolved around the declarations of climate emergency at the local, regional and national levels in Colombia; the second, held on July 29th, presented the current landscape of biodiversity and natural capital in the context of the climate emergency, and showed examples of how natural capital can catalyze innovative solutions at the service of sustainable and regenerative development.




5th Low Carbon City World Forum

After the previous editions, organized respectively in Colombia, Mexico, Paris and Costa Rica, the fifth Low Carbon City World Forum took place between September 22nd and 25th 2020.

The forum was held virtually and we brought together experts from around the world on topics such as regenerative development, frontier technologies, circular economy, slow cities, and planetary health, among others. This with the purpose of promoting climate action by citizens, academia, the public and private sectors, and by showcasing different initiatives and solutions that seek to promote the mitigation and adaptation of their territories to climate change.

Webinars, Workshops and more

To keep our community connected with interesting and innovative topics, continued creating learning spaces for all audiences. Likewise, we linked to spaces organized by allies and friends in our network, to exchange experiences.

- Workshop prototyping the post-covid city aimed at young university students alliance with the Technical September University of Berlin. November.
- Let's talk for the planet organized by the Government of Antioquia within the framework of the Climate **Emergency Declaration.**









Courses

We designed and carried out three Climate Finance Courses. One with the Manizales Autonomous University and Corpocaldas for officials of the Regional Climate Change Node, another with Eafit University, and one independently for private sector actors.



77 participants

We developed a Course on Climate Change for public servants in the Andean, Amazon and Orinoquía, Caribbean and Pacific regions, in alliance with the Climate Reality project, the Procuraduría of Colombia (equivalent of the Attorney general's office) , the Ministry of Environment, the Climate Group, Fondo Acción, OpEPA, GIZ and the National department for planning. Our module was focused on communication, governance and community empowerment for addressing climate change.



We designed the Food Safety and Climate Change Course in partnership with the CES University that will be open to the public in 2021.

We participated in the group of experts that reviewed the update of Colombia's NDC at the invitation of the Ministry of Environment and Sustainable Development. Likewise, we helped spread the public consultation process with our stakeholders.

We had the opportunity to lead the Technical Table the on Climate Crisis, with the purpose of generating inputs for Medellín's Development Plan regarding Climate Change components. This exercise resulted in a publication that was delivered to the city's environment secretary.

We also participated and generated citizen and technical comments during the drafting of the Medellín Climate Change Plan during the year, advocating for increased citizen participation.

We created the reel video series #HéroesClimáticos to promote and showcase actors with initiatives working to address climate change from different perspectives. In the first episode we invited Marcela Fernández, co-founder of Cumbres Blancas, a foundation dedicated to giving visibility to Colombian Glaciers. Our second guest was Federico Restrepo, co-founder of Energía Vectorial, a company that converts conventional cars into electric cars.







Publications

Our carbon footprint & offsetting



At Low Carbon City we are aware of the impact our work can have on the planet, even in the virtual world, because even those activities have a digital footprint. For this reason, since 2016 we have been measuring and offsetting our emissions with our technical partners INCYCLO for measurement, and with our partners CO2 Zero for offsetting. In 2020 we emitted 15.7 tonnes of CO2 equivalent, offset through the Cordillera Central Forest Project by CO2 Zero. In this way we certify that our work is Carbon Neutral.
